- EARLY DAYS
- 1780 (Madras) until the 1930s
- Racing with imported horses-Arabs or English/Antipodean stock





- By the 1930s, breeding going on in India mainly for Army.
- Thoroughbred blood filtering in.
- Mr Soparivala (Pune) and Maj. Dennis Vanrenen (Punjab)





- Increase in number of horses.
- Increase in racecourses.
- Close to a hundred race courses.



Transformation of the country-bred to the Indian Thoroughbred








Founder of the Eve Bloodstock Scheme

His obituary in the Bloodstock Breeders' Review in 1938 says:

He was noted for his fierce advocacy and his energetic work in endeavoring to develop a pure "Indian-bred" horse. He set out after the World War to evolve what he termed "a new and true Indian horse based on imported thoroughbred blood







One of the earliest pioneers of the breeding industry. Spearheaded the campaign to save racing which was under the axe due to political decisions

Mr Faly Wadia





National Horse Breeding And Show Society of India (now National Horse Breeding Society of India)

Produced an Indian Stud Book in 1927 which included breeds like the Thoroughbreds, Trotters, Marwari, Kathiawari, Desert Arabians, etc.





Royal Western India Turf Club published the first volume of THE INDIAN STUD BOOK in 1942

GLEN LOAN (2nd in the Eclipse Stakes to BLUE PETER)
HOCUS POCUS (Irish 2000 Guineas)
MACKANN (French 2000 Guineas)
PORTMARNOCK (Champion English 2YO in 1937)
MONDRAGON (Irish Derby)
PARADINE (2nd in English 2000 Guineas) and broodmares like
LAUGHING WATER (2nd in in the English 1000 Guineas and dam of champion Indian filly HER MAJESTY),
WICK BRIDGE (2nd in in the Irish 1000 Guineas)





Import of Foreign Horses was halted in June 1941 due to World War II





The wartime ban on imports was lifted in 1945 and a large shipment of high quality English mares arrived in October 1946

The effective number of mares rose from only 385 in 1940 to over 1000 in 1947





Disastrous setback post Independence

1947: decision to ban racing announced

Grace period of six years to wind up stud farms

Many Northern farms lost to Pakistan after Partition, many Indian farms shut down and mare population plummeted to 400

Severe import restriction

Land ceilings

Taxation policies





Growth in the Sixties and Seventies

Slow import liberalization as foreign exchange position of India improved





Better situation in the Eighties and Nineties

Substantial progress




